What is sanctioning?

October 13-14 NBEA Bronze Championships

A sanctioned competition has been approved by a governing body and will adhere to its rules and safety requirements. EC and NBEA sanctioning ensures the competition meets standards, carries liability insurance, and uses officials that have acquired national training.

Why should I attend sanctioned competitions?

- These competitions all run under the same Equestrian Canada rules (see the links below)
- Points can be earned throughout the season toward year-end awards
- Officials are certified
- Safety and first aid personnel are on site
- Biosecurity measures are observed, and fair play is governed through equine medications control testing.

Why should I sanction my show?

- Access to templates for entry forms and prize lists
- Printed rule books
- Two governing bodies to assist you
- Access to funding
- Provincial and national points tabulation
- Certified officials
- National and provincial website listings
- Lower insurance rates

Memberships required

A competitor requires an annual NBEA membership to compete in all sanctioned show. In addition, an *Equestrian Canada* Sport License is that matches the category of shows is required - Bronze or Gold. Some disciplines, such as dressage, may require membership to their provincial body as well.

Horses in Gold competitions also need an EC horse recording number.

Vaccinations Required

This is a very individual decision best made between owner and vet, for each horse. For competition, every competition makes their own rules about what inoculations it requires. Although Equestrian Canada is looking at the idea of minimum mandatory vaccinations, there's nothing in the rule books yet. In an effort to step up biosecurity practices, the NBEA as implemented a funding program whereby competition organizers can qualify for a percentage of their officials' fees if they require **flu**, **rhino**, **strangles**, **and a negative Coggins test**. The horse must have had his shots within 7 months of the show date, but no later than 7 days before.

However, for now, even sanctioned competitions may choose to ask for these vaccinations, or more, or even less. Check *each* competition's prize list to be sure.

Year-End Awards

Horses and riders, or drivers, that have competed and placed in the top six spots at a minimum of two EC-sanctioned competitions offering eligible classes will have their points count toward year end awards in Bronze (provincial) and Gold (national) categories.

How are points earned and calculated for year-end awards?

Points for placing in the class are multiplied by the number of horses competing in that class, and added all season. Points are earned by the rider for equitation classes, and by the horse for all other classes.

1st place - - - - 6 pts 2nd place - - - 5 pts 3rd place - - - - 4 pts 4th place - - - - 3 pts 5th place - - - - 2 pts 6th place - - - - 1 pt

EXAMPLE

Points awarded at a Bronze Show in a class of 10 horses: 1st place (6x10) 60 pts

2nd place (5x10) 50 pts 3rd place (4x10) 40 pts
