The NBEA Bronze General Performance Championship is a sanctioned Bronze competition member of Equine Canada (EC), 308 Leggit Drive, Suite 100, Ottawa, Ontario, K2K-1Y6 and is governed by the rules of EC. Every class offered herein is covered by the current rules and specifications of EC and will be held and judged in accordance with the EC Rule Book.

Equine Canada Statement of Principle

Equine Canada (EC), the national equestrian federation of Canada, supports adherence to humane treatment of horses in all activities under its jurisdiction.

EC is committed to:

- Upholding the welfare of the horses, regardless of value, as a primary consideration in all activities;
- Requiring that horses be treated with kindness, respect and the compassion that they deserve, and that they never be subjected to mistreatment;
- Ensuring that owners, trainers and exhibitors or their agents use responsible care in the handling, treatment and transportation of their horses as well as horses placed in their care for any purpose;
- Providing for the continuous well-being of horses by encouraging routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals and competition officials to achieve the highest possible standards of nutrition, health, comfort and safety as a matter of standard operating procedure;
- Providing current information on Code of Practice of the Care and Handling of Equines and other health and welfare initiatives;
- Continuing to support scientific studies on equine health and welfare;
- Requiring owners, trainers and exhibitors to know and follow their sanctioning organization's rules, and to work within industry regulations in all equestrian competition;
- Reviewing, revising and developing competition rules and regulations that protect the welfare of the horses.

The standard by which conduct or treatment will be measured is that which a person, informed and experienced in generally accepted equine training and exhibition procedures, would determine to be neither cruel, abusive nor inhumane.

Every entry at an EC sanctioned competition shall constitute an agreement by the person responsible (see definition in entry form section) that the owner, lessee, trainer, manager, agent, coach, driver or rider and horse shall be subject to the EC constitution and all rules of EC and any additional rules set by the competition. It is the responsibility of all individuals participating in any capacity in EC sanctioned competitions to be knowledgeable regarding the EC Constitution and the applicable rules of EC and additional rules, if any, imposed by the competition. Do not participate in the EC sanctioned competition in any capacity if you do not consent to be bound by the constitution and rules of EC and any additional rules imposed by the constitution.

SHOW RULES

Administration:

- 1. All entry forms due no later than five (5) days prior to the show as entries may need to be limited in some classes for safety and management purposes.
- Any late entries received after 5 days prior to the show date will be charged an additional administration fee of \$35.00 per horse.
- Drop off or mail show forms to: New Brunswick Equestrian Assn., 900 Hanwell Road, Unit 13, Fredericton NB E3B 6A2
- 4. Make all cheques payable to "New Brunswick Equestrian Association" and must accompany signed entry form(s).
- 5. No post dated cheques accepted. NSF cheques will be charged \$50 administration fee.
- 6. No entries will be accepted by telephone or fax.
- 7. All entries must be complete and made in writing (Article A801.4). The show numbers will not be issued if all the required signatures are not complete and payment is not made in full.
- 8. Hunter and Jumper Classes are entered by division only.
- 9. Post entries will be accepted up to one hour prior to the class and will be subject to an additional \$5 charge per class or division.
- 10. Scratches will not be reimbursed.
- 11. Official protests must be made in writing to the secretary of the competition, signed and accompanied by a \$100.00 cash deposit within 48 hours of competition of the class, Equine Canada Article A1206.
- 12. Ribbons 1st to 6th place, Trophies for 1st, High Point Prizes.
- 13. Equine Canada Rule A814: Competition numbers must be worn and visible at all times in show ring and in exercise areas.
- 14. Show Committee reserves the right to measure any pony or horse entered in the show.
- 15. Every class offered herein is covered by the rules and specifications of the current rules of Equine Canada and will be held and judged in accordance with the Equine Canada Rule Book. Any incident requiring a ruling which cannot be referenced to the EC Rule Book, will be rendered by the Show Committee.
- 16. If less than four entries are received for any class, the show committee reserves the right to cancel or combine classes where the rules are applicable.
- 17. Entry forms must be signed by exhibitor, owner and person responsible. If the owner or exhibitor is under 19 years of age, the entry must be signed by a parent or legal guardian who assumes all responsibility and risk as stated on the form and by these rules and regulations. The entry form for all sanctioned competitions shall also be signed by the person responsible for the care, training, custody and performance of the horse. The person responsible may be the trainer, owner, rider, agent or coach. The parent or guardian must sign the entry form if there is no other person responsible. The person responsible is to be present at the competition and if they cannot attend, must appoint a representative who is present on the show grounds and must notify the competition secretary. Article A1011. With the exception of a parent or (Glossary page 113, Section A, see A214.2), the person responsible who signs an entry form must hold an EC or USEF individual license. (see A203.5). Foreign entries must sign an affidavit (Article A404).
- 18. Management has the right to expel any rider, owner or spectator deemed to be in their sole discretion disruptive to the show at any time.
- 19. Dogs must be leashed or caged while on the show grounds. The Owners are solely and expressly responsible for their dogs and the dog's behavior. Owners of loose dogs will be charged \$75.00 to retrieve their pets.
- 20. Absolutely "NO" smoking permitted on show grounds.
- 21. The show office will open one (1) hour prior to the start of the show and close 1/2 hour at the end of the show.
- 22. Bronze Sport licenses are required for all classes and can be purchased at www.equinecanada.ca.

Services Offered

1) A limited number of Box Stalls are available at a cost of \$30.00 per stall per night, bagged shavings are for

sale \$7.00 per bag. Stalls are to be cleaned out at the end of the show. First priority will be given to exhibitors traveling from outside the Fredericton/Oromocto area.

- 2) Hay is available at \$5.00 per bale.
- 3) Warm up area will be available on the show grounds. Warm up area is an enclosed sand ring. No more than one horse may be lunged when riders are in the warm up ring and no lunging is allowed if more than four riders are warming up.

Directions:

To get to Geary Hill Stables take the Exit 303 at Oromocto. Keep to the right on Miramichi Road. Travel through the traffic circle past the Canadian Tire and keep to your right. As you near the 2nd traffic circle, travel to the right heading toward Geary. Follow Route 102 South toward Geary. You will come to a stop sign; make a right turning on to the Broad Road. Travel 6.5 km past an abandoned gas station on the left, over a small stone bridge, take the first right to the New Road. Travel approximately 0.75km and turn left at Geary Hill Stables Driveway at #31 New Road.

The entry fees for individual classes/jumping divisions are:

Hunter (Intro, Beginner, Low) Divisions \$60.00 Jumper Divisions \$40.00

Individual Classes (not part of Hunter/Jumper divisions) \$20.00

The class/division fees will be waived if:

•The competitor competed in a minimum of two NBEA sanctioned Bronze competitions during the 2014 show year, and

•The competitor has placed from 1st to 6th in the same class entered in at least two of the shows and the class(s) description corresponds to the class entered at the Championship

•If the competitor did not place from 1st to 6th in all classes in a Hunter or Jumper division at a minimum of two shows, the entry fee for the division may be pro-rated at the discretion of the show committee.

Example:

A rider competes in Pony English Pleasure and Pony Road Hack at two Equine Canada sanctioned Bronze shows in New Brunswick. The rider places as follows:

Show #1

Pony English Pleasure 3rd Pony Road Hack 2nd

Show #2

Pony English Pleasure 6th

Pony Road Hack Not Placed

This rider would have the entry fee for Pony English Pleasure waived, but would have to pay the class fee of \$20 for Pony Road Hack.

Exhibitor Requirements

- Equine Canada Bronze Sport License and NBEA membership are required to compete in Bronze classes.
 Foreign entries must sign an affidavit (Article A404). Equine Canada Bronze License is NOT required for exhibitors competing only in Lead Line.
- Bronze memberships may be purchased online at <u>www.equinecanada.ca</u>. Your receipt will be proof of memberships. Temporary one-day memberships are no longer available.
- Any horse, in any class at a competition, may, while on the competition grounds, be selected for equine medication control testing. (Article A602.5)
- Coggins test must be shown at office when picking up ring numbers. Coggins tests with a stamped date within last two years will be accepted.
- 5) Horses must show proof of current vaccinations for rabies, tetanus and flu.
- 6) Non-showing horses: All non-competing horses brought on the property during the competition must have a signed blank entry and owners and non-competing riders must have a current NBEA membership. Anyone riding non competing horses which have been brought on to the show grounds must wear a number issued by the office.
- 7) Amateur Owners must have current credentials (Article G108 and G704). An eligible temporary sport license holder may compete in amateur classes provided an Amateur Affidavit has been completed and is on file with the competition secretary (A208.4). A photocopy of the current amateur card must be attached with entry A802 e).
- 8) As per Equine Canada rule article A805, the Show Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry, except as provided in 805.2 (a,b,c,d,e).

- 9) The show will forfeit 75% of the entry fee less the fees for classes completed if the horse entered is withdrawn due to unsoundness or sickness provided a veterinarian's certificate is produced, dated no later than the closing day of the show and received within 10 days of the show date.
- All riders, grooms, attendants and handlers must be neatly dressed on entering the ring. ARTICLE G109 DRESS.

SAFETY RULES:

- 1) ARTICLE G102 HEADGEAR
 - a. <u>All competitors</u> must wear ASTM (American Society for Testing Materials), SEI, EN, AS/NZS or BSI approved helmets, with safety harness correctly fastened, at all times while mounted on the competition grounds.
 - b. Juniors showing any horse in a jog for soundness must wear approved protective headwear with the attached safety harness fastened.
 - c. EC makes no representation or warranty expressed or implied about any protective headgear and cautions riders that serious injury or death may result despite wearing such headgear as all equestrian sports involve inherent dangerous risk and adds no protective helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries.
 - All violations which occur outside the competition arena will be reported to the judge/jury who will levy the applicable penalty.
 - e. All violations which occur in the competition arena will be acted upon by the judge(s) who will levy the applicable penalty.
 - f. For all competitors, if the harness comes undone or the hat falls off, the rider must retrieve and/or do up the hat, with assistance if necessary, before the next obstacle is taken. There will be no penalty other than the loss of time. Failure to do up the harness or retrieve protective headgear immediately results in elimination.
- The show committee does not accept responsibility for accidents or illness to horses, riders, grooms, spectators or any other persons.
- 3) Exhibitors competing for provincial points are requested to enter the animal in the name of the member of the family who is the official Equine Canada member.
- 4) FALLS

After being eliminated for a fall, the rider may not remount in the ring. Any rider who does remount in the ring after a fall will be eliminated from all classes in that ring for the remainder of the day. A rider who remounts after a fall and takes another obstacle will be disqualified from the remainder of the show.

- 5) IN-GATE
 - In all classes, trotting or cantering through the in-gate without prior permission is forbidden. The penalty for contravening this rule is either a fine or elimination from the class, at the discretion of the judge. Under special circumstances, a steward or judge may give permission for a horse to trot into the ring, but not out of the ring.
- STALLIONS
 Stallions are not permitted at this competition
- HORS CONCOURS
 "Hors Concours" is not allowed at this competition
- 8) The use of Cell phones, IPODS, etc. is not allowed while riding.
- 9) Any horse that becomes out of control shall be eliminated from the competition at the discretion of the judge.
- 10) Schooling Rules for Hunter/Jumper: see Annex 1 page 103 Section G rule book.
- 11) Rules for this competition may be downloaded for free on Equine Canada's

Website or ordered from the NBEA office. Read: Section F General Performance, Western, Equitation and refer to Section A for Equine Canada's General Regulations

Bronze competitors require NBEA membership. Bronze Membership may be purchased from Equine Canada (www.equinecanada.ca) – printed receipt will be accepted for proof of Equine Canada membership.

Miscellaneous classes – not rated for EC awards.

Note: Horses Entering Bronze Hunter Divisions may only enter 2 of 3 divisions (i.e., Intro and Beginner Hunter OR Beginner and Heritage Low Hunter)

INTRO HUNTER

Entry Fee: \$60 for division (2 over fences and 1 under saddle)

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

- 31. Intro Hunter #1 (Over fences: A simple hunter course of at least 8 fences with no combinations. Emphasis of judging on manners, obedience and style. Trotting to fences will not be penalized. Distances not to be adjusted for horses and ponies. Maximum height and width to be 22" (0.55m). Fences may be low verticals or oxers. Majority of fence to be 18" (0.45m). Open to seniors riding horses or large ponies and juniors riding horses or ponies of any height.
- 32. Intro Hunter #2
- 43. Intro Hunter Under Saddle (To be shown at walk, trot and canter, both ways of the ring. No more than eight to hand-gallop at one time. To be eligible horses/ponies must have completed the course in at least one fences class in their respective division.)

Entries in this division are limited to the Intro and Beginner Hunter Divisions. A pony ridden by an adult must not be shown by a junior in the same competition.

BEGINNER HUNTER

Entry Fee: \$60 for division (2 over fences and 1 under saddle)

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

- 33. Beginner Hunter #1 (To complete a hunter-type jumping course of at least 8 obstacles not to exceed 2'6" (0.75m) in height. To be judged on obedience, jumping form and general way of going. Open to seniors riding horses or large ponies and juniors riding horses or ponies. The course may, but is not required, to be adjusted in height and distance for ponies.) Juniors of any age may show any height of pony in miscellaneous, non-point classes. G306.
- 34. Beginner Hunter #2
- 44. Beginner Hunter Under Saddle

HERITAGE LOW HUNTER

Entry Fee: \$60 for division (2 over fences and 1 under saddle)

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

- 35. Heritage Low Hunter # 1: 0.85m **Open only to horses** ridden by a Junior or Senior rider. Horses judged on obedience, jumping form and general way of going.
- 36. Heritage Low Hunter #2
- 45. Heritage Low Hunter Under Saddle

Entries in this division are limited to the Beginner Hunter and Heritage Low Hunter Divisions.

2'6" (0.75m) JUMPER DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$40 for division (2 over fences)

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

Equine Canada rules Section F Article G701-708

- Horses are to be judged only on performance. Courses will be posted at least 30 minutes prior to the class starting.
- Time allowed must be used in all classes in the Jumper Division
- There will be one jump off (if needed) against the clock

Entries in this division are limited to the Jumper 2'6" (0.75m) and 2'9" (0.85m) Divisions

2'9" (0.85m) JUMPER DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$40 for division (2 over fences)

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

Equine Canada rules Section F Article G701-708

- Horses are to be judged only on performance. Courses will be posted at least 30 minutes prior to the class starting.
- Time allowed must be used in all classes in the Jumper Division
- There will be one jump off (if needed) against the clock

3' (0.90m) JUMPER DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$40 for division (2 over fences)

- Horses are to be judged only on performance. Courses will be posted at least 30 minutes prior to the class starting.
- Time allowed must be used in all classes in the Jumper Division
- There will be one jump off (if needed) against the clock

Entries in this division are limited to the Jumper 2'9" (0.85m) and 3' (0.90m) Divisions

EQUITATION DIVISION (Miscellaneous – not rated for EC awards)

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

Equine Canada rule section G1001-1109, F1805

Equitation classes are divided by age groups as follows: Individuals are juniors until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 18. Article A901.

Routine on the flat: Article G1008. Riders will proceed at least once around the ring at each gait – walk, trot and canter, reverse and repeat.

At the judge's discretion, they may be asked to execute an individual test.

- 46. Pony English Equitation Junior and Junior C riders. Junior A riders may only ride large ponies.
- 47. Jr. "A" Hunter Seat (not to jump) Equine Canada
 Riders are such from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach the age of

16 until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 18.

- 48. Jr. "B" Hunter Seat (not to jump) Equine Canada Riders are such from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 13 until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 15.
- 49. Jr. "C" Hunter Seat (not to jump) Equine Canada Riders are such until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 12.
- 50. Senior Hunter Seat (not to jump) Equine Canada Members will be classified as Senior from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 19.

ENGLISH HACK DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st) Equine Canada rules Section F1601 English Pleasure (E.C.) Article F1611 Road Hack (E.C.) Article F1610

- To be shown at a flat-footed walk, normal trot and easy canter and to gallop; light contact with the horse's mouth; to be judged on manners, performance, quality and conformation.
- Tack and personal appointments to be appropriate to the seat being ridden.
- If ridden by a junior, heights of ponies and age of riders to be the same as in pony hunters (Article G306).

 - 52. Youth English Pleasure (Junior C)
 - 53. Junior English Pleasure

Western Age Divisions:

- A Junior rider maintains junior status until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 18.
- Youth (Junior C) 13 yrs and under
- Junior 14-18 yrs
- Pony Open to Junior and Youth riders. Ponies may only enter classes in the pony division.
- Novice: Open to Junior and Senior riders in their first or second year showing.
- Open: Open to Junior and Senior riders

WESTERN HALTER DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

Equine Canada rules Section F Article F1901-1903

- Horses are to be shown in hand with a serviceable halter, silver equipment will not count over a
 practical halter or bridle, at walk and trot.
- Horses should stand square on all four feet and are to be handled and shown throughout the entire class by only one person.
- Emphasis shall be placed upon type, conformation, substance and quality
- Western Hats or helmets must be worn in non-mounted Western classes.

WESTERN SHOWMANSHIP DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

Equine Canada rules Section G Article F1901-1903

- The showmanship class shall be judged strictly on the competitor's ability to fit and show a horse at halter. The horse is merely a prop to demonstrate the ability and preparation of the competitor.
- The ideal showmanship performance consists of a poised, confident, neatly attired competitor, leading a
 well-groomed and conditioned horse that quickly and efficiently performs the requested pattern with
 promotness, smoothness, and precision.
- The showmanship class is not a halter class and should not be judged as such.
- Western Hats or helmets must be worn in non-mounted Western classes.

WESTERN PLEASURE DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

Equine Canada rules Section G Article F601-603, F501

 This class will be judged on the performance, condition and conformation of the horse; however, a minimum of 20% of the judging shall be placed on condition and conformation.

- Horses must work both ways of the ring at all three gaits to demonstrate their ability with different leads. At the option of the judge, horses may be asked to extend the walk, jog, or lope, one or both ways of the ring.
- Horses are required to back easily and stand quietly.
- Horses are to be reversed to the inside (away from the rail). They may be required to reverse at the
 walk or jog at the discrimination of the judge, but shall not be asked to reverse at the lope.
- Competitors must wear appropriate western attire, including a shirt with long sleeves and a collar, approved helmet and cowboy boots.
- Allt riders must wear approved protective headgear for competition and during warm-up prior to competition. Approved protective headgear must be worn at all times when schooling horses at the event location.
- Spurs and chaps are optional.
 - 11. Open Snaffle Bit (Horses 5 years and younger)
 - 12. Pony Western Pleasure
 - 13. Youth (Junior C) Western Pleasure
 - 14. Junior (rider) Western Pleasure

WESTERN HORSEMANSHIP DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st)

Equine Canada rules Section G Article F2213-2214, F501

- Riders will be judged on seat, hands, and ability to control and show horse.
- Results as shown by performance of the horse are NOT to be considered more important than the method used by the rider.
- The competitor so overall poise, confidence, appearance and position throughout the class as well as the
 physical condition of the horse will be evaluated
- Competitors must wear appropriate western attire, including a shirt with long sleeves and a collar, approved helmet and cowboy boots.
- All riders must wear approved protective headgear or Western hats for competition and during warm-up prior to competition. Approved protective headgear must be worn at all times when schooling horses at the event location.
- Spurs and chaps are optional.

WESTERN TRAIL DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons $(1^{st} - 6^{th})$, trophy (1^{st})

Equine Canada rules Section G Article F2213-2214

- The Trail Horse Class is the performance of a safe, sensible, well-mannered horse over a course of obstacles.
- This class will be judged on the performance of the horse over the obstacles, with emphasis on manners, response to the rider and quality of movement
- Credit will be given to those horses negotiating the obstacles with style and some degree of speed, providing correctness is not sacrificed.

WESTERN COMMAND DIVISION

Entry Fee: \$20 per class

Prize: Ribbons (1st – 6th), trophy (1st) Equine Canada rules Section G Article F1001-1003

- The command class is neither a race nor is it a gymkhana event. It is a competition that exhibits the abilities of a well trained, responsive performance horse.
- Riders must be neatly dressed in suitable western attire as outlined in Chapter 8: Western Riding.

Person Responsible:

For the purpose of these Rules, the Person Responsible is normally the trainer, owner or the competitor who rides or drives the horse during an event, or a parent or legal guardian in the case of junior competitors. The Person Responsible is ultimately responsible for the condition, fitness and management of horse and is alone responsible for an act performed in the stables by himself or herself or by any other person with authorized access to the horse, or while the horse is being ridden, driven or exercised. The Person Responsible must hold a valid EC Sport License in good standing at the same level or higher in which the horse is competing. However, when the competitor is a Junior, the competitor cannot be the person responsible and the Person Responsible may be a parent/guardian who must be an EC member in good standing.

Parents and Guardians are entitled to sign their children's entry forms without being EC members or holder of a Sport License, provided they agree to abide by the rules and penalties contained in the Rule Book. However, the owner of the horse must hold a valid EC Sport License and the owner's EC Sport License number must be included on all entry forms.
